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Tracking System - Split A

Until 2012, Cincinnati had an “early warning system” that tracked whether police unfairly stopped people of different races at different rates. Out of the last several years, 2012 had the lowest racial disparity in traffic stops: 1.3 times, meaning that in an area with equal populations of Black and White people, police stopped 1.3 Black people for every 1 White person they stopped. This racial disparity rose to 3.2 times in 2025, meaning that police stopped over 3 Black people for every 1 White person. CCA Independence

The Citizen Complaint Authority (CCA) is an oversight agency in Cincinnati that investigates serious incidents by police officers – including shots fired, deaths in custody and major uses of force, and resolves citizen complaints against police officers. The CCA consists of a board of seven citizens appointed by the Mayor and approved by City Council, a full-time Executive Director appointed by the City Manager, and a team of professional investigators. The City Manager, also appointed by the Mayor, has final approval over its internal procedures. Generally speaking, should the CCA operate as a fully independent body, reporting directly to the City Council? This would mean the CCA would not report to the City Manager.

Removal of Records

In Cincinnati, per the police union contract, any records related to charges or allegations against an officer that were “not sustained” or “unfounded” (in other words, the charges or allegations did not result in additional disciplinary action) must be removed from the officer’s personnel file immediately and destroyed. This survey is based on 350 interviews conducted by YouGov on the internet of registered voters in Hamilton County, Ohio predominantly within the city of Cincinnati. The sample was weighted according to gender, age, race/ethnicity, education, and U.S. Census region based on voter registration lists, the U.S. Census American Community Survey, and the U.S. Census Current Population Survey, as well as 2020 Presidential vote and approximate 2024 Presidential vote based on available results, and party identification estimates based on Pew Research Center's National Public Opinion Reference Survey. Respondents were selected from YouGov to be representative of registered voters in Hamilton County, Ohio predominantly within the city of Cincinnati. The weights range from 0.08 to 6.05 with a mean of 1 and a standard deviation of 0.81.

The margin of error (a 95% confidence interval) for a sample percentage p based upon the subsetting sample is approximately 6.8%. It is calculated using the formula:

$$\hat{p} \pm 100 \times \sqrt{\frac{1 + CV^2}{n}}$$

where CV is the coefficient of variation of the sample weights and n is the sample size used to compute the proportion. This is a measure of sampling error (the average of all estimates obtained using the same sample selection and weighting procedures repeatedly). The sample estimate should differ from its expected value by less than margin of error in 95 percent of all samples. It does not reflect non-sampling errors, including potential selection bias in panel participation or in response to a particular survey.
